LLM SPECIALIZING IN CRIMINAL LAW AND PROCEDURE

The degree requirements will be satisfied upon the completion of 36 credits. There are two options for completing this degree:

Option I [36 credits]

- The **required courses** for Criminal Law and Procedure [18 credits];
- 12 additional credits of coursework, at least 6 of which must be courses from the Criminal Law and Procedure-related electives*
- A Major Research Paper (70 pages) in the Criminal Law and Procedure field [6 credits]
- Advanced Legal Research Workshop**

Option II [36 credits]

- The **required courses** for Criminal Law and Procedure [18 credits];
- 18 additional credits of coursework, at least 12 of which must be courses from the Criminal Law and Procedure-related electives*
- A Significant Research Paper (30 pages) as a means of evaluation for one of the Criminal Law and Procedure required courses or related electives**

** The Advanced Legal Research Workshop is required for all students who wish to complete a Major Research Paper and does not count towards the 36 credits required to complete the degree. The Advanced Legal Research Workshop is not required for students writing a Significant Research Paper but is strongly recommended in order for students to review writing and research skills. In general, the Advanced Legal Research Workshop is offered every term. Please consult the [term schedule](#) for dates. The **required courses** for Criminal Law and Procedure are:

- Issues in Criminal Law: History, Evolution and Theoretical Approaches [6 credits]
- Criminal Law and the *Charter*: Implications and Expectations [6 credits]
- Persuasion and Proof: Issues in Fact Finding and Evidence [3 credits]
- The Theory and Practice of Punishment [3 credits]

Students are responsible for completing 36 credits by taking the required courses and choosing from the elective course offerings, subject to the degree requirements above.
